

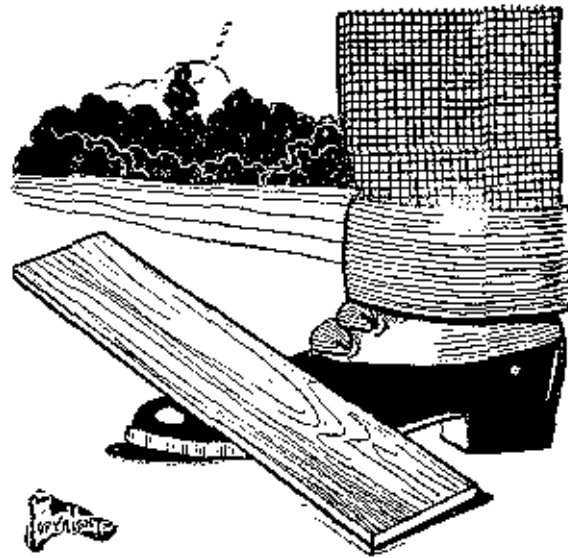
Rules and Regulations

Admission to Grounds.

1. The payment of \$1.00 as annual subscription fee shall constitute membership, and each member will be given two admission tickets to Exhibition.
2. Admission fee of 25c will be charged all adults without tickets; children under 15 years, 15c.
3. Judges and members of the Press will be supplied with tickets and badges on application to the Secretary.

Entries

1. Entries close on Monday, October 15th.
2. None but members who have paid their subscription to the Society for the current year, can be permitted to enter any exhibit at the Exhibition.
3. The ladies of a member's family together with the children under 15 years, may make their entries by virtue of the membership of the head of the family.
4. All entries must be made on printed forms at back of Prize List. Extra forms can be obtained on application to President or Secretary; these forms should be filled up and signed by exhibitor.

5. Exhibitors may send their entries by mail and receive their tickets on arrival at grounds.

6. Entries should be made in order mentioned in Prize List.

7. All entries, other than live stock, must be sent in to the Secretary on or before 12 o'clock, noon, on Monday, October 15th, in order to allow time to correct any errors that may occur; for live stock, not later than 10 o'clock on Tuesday, October 16th.

8. For each exhibit a card will be furnished the exhibitor specifying the class, section and entry number, which card must remain attached to exhibit during exhibition.

9. No exhibitor shall be allowed to make more than one entry in any one section of a class. This rule does not apply to live stock.

Delivery of Exhibits.

1. All exhibits must be on the grounds and in position not later than 10 a. m. October 16th, when judging will commence. THIS RULE MUST BE STRICTLY OBSERVED.

SPECIAL NOTICE. As it is intended to have the Exhibition fully open to the public as soon as possible, exhibitors are especially notified that articles or animals arriving after the above time cannot be permitted to compete.

Live Stock.

1. Hay and water will be furnished free of charge for Live Stock exhibited at the exhibition.

2. In all classes where certificates of registration are required, the same must be produced to the judges before the judging takes place. Declaration is sufficient for animals under one year old.

3. All horses and cattle for exhibition must be securely tied, swine and sheep to be put into the Society's pens.

4. Any exhibitor exhibiting live stock which has not been owned by him 10 days previous to the exhibition, shall forfeit his right to a prize.

5. All horses or cattle winning prizes, must be exhibited in the stock-parade when required, or the prize will be forfeited.

Judges and Judging.

1. Judging will commence at 10 a. m., 2nd October.

2. No person will be allowed to act as judge who is in any way interested in the exhibits that person is to judge.

3. Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary as soon as possible.

4. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing and it must be delivered to the Secretary before 6 p. m. of the second day of the Exhibition.

5. No person will be permitted in the horse and cattle rings during the time of judging, except the judges or assistants, persons in charge of the animals, directors of the society or members of the Press.

6. All prize cards, which have been affixed by the judges, must be displayed during the Exhibition.

7. No prize will be awarded to any exhibit that the judges do not consider merits the same.

8. Any exhibitor who shall attempt to interfere with or influence the judges while in discharge of their duties, or who shall use contemptuous or abusive language to a judge, in consequence of awards made.

4. Every successful exhibitor shall pay his annual fee for the coming year, from the amount due said exhibitor. No person shall be entitled to claim payment of prizes until 14 days after the awarding thereof.

The Directors will meet on 30th of October, 1906, for the purpose of hearing and determining any protests that have arisen regarding awards and prizes.
